
Season's first 8000er SUMMIT in Pakistan: Polish Hajzer and Szymczak top-out Nanga Parbat! Polish winter wolves Artur Hajzer and Robert Szymczak summited Nanga Parbat yesterday (23.06.2010) at 1:30pm, Pakistan time, after fighting loads of snow and bad weather on a 15 hours-long climb from Camp 4. It would take them nearly 10 hours more to reach back their high camp. A concerning silence followed summit news though. Artur and Robert made no further contact. As hours passed, concerns grew among the expedition members. Luckily, the weather cleared up yesterday evening, permitting the BC crew to spot the summiteers through binoculars at 7,300m - 2 hours away from the tents. The Polish team was the first to set foot on an 8000er this current summer season. Divided into smaller teams, they've worked on their own for weeks and fixed the entire Kinshoffer route. The current climb is the first stage of a 5 year-long project known as Polish Winter Himalayan Climbing 2010-2015. Seasoned climbers as Artur (expedition leader) and Robert are teaming up with younger climbers on their first Himalayan experience. According to plans, after Nanga Parbat the team will move to the Karakorum Range in order to climb both Gasherbrums.

Well we finally did it. Having waited so many years for the opportunity the climbing was no fuss at all. We arrived in Rackwick bay at 5:15pm on the Friday evening 2nd July and because of the fine weather we chose to grasp the opportunity and set off on the 3mile hike across the

headland immediately. We were on top by 10pm, back down at its base by midnight and back at the Rackwick Bay Bothy by 1:30pm. Unfortunately our ropes got jammed in the crack of the second pitch so we decided to leave them behind and retrieve them the following day. We had decided that our second ascent would be by the South Face E2 5c but on arrival at the stack there was an almighty gale blowing as had been the previous night so thought better of it and climbed the classic E1 5b again just for the hell of it (and retrieve the ropes).





We were puked at by Fulmars at intervals throughout, Paul (Cleary) and me managed to duck and dodge the projectile's but Jamie caught one right on the side of his face and in his ear which splattered green gung all over his top. His description of the warm snot like substance dribbling down the side of his face reinforced our decision to give him a wide berth from that point on! Also had a Puffin fly in to roost on my right foot whilst stood on a ledge below the first abseil from the top. It looked up at me and not expecting to meet a bloke standing in its bedroom, panicked and flew back out in a rush.

#### **Medex Porter Mortality and Morbidity Project**

You will no doubt be aware that we conducted a questionnaire based research project in the spring on location in Nepal to collect data on the mortality and morbidity of porters who support trekking and expedition groups. 5 researchers went out to Nepal including several medical students. The research was supported by Porters Progress and Mary Morrell very kindly agreed to be the key research supervisor. We hope to develop this research in future trekking seasons and are interested in hearing from any medical students or others who can spend four or five weeks in Nepal at peak trekking season time to conduct further research studies.
